STATEMENTS BY THE COMMUNITIES AND THE MINISTER PRESIDENT

Armin Laschet, Minister President of the State of North Rhine-Westphalia:

"We welcome and are supporting the initiative for a bid by the 'Rhein Ruhr City 2032' for the 2032 Olympic and Para-Olympic Games. The unique metropolitan region in the heart of Europe looks back on a long tradition of sport, immense enthusiasm for sport and a sporting landscape that is unique in its diversity. I am delighted about the pioneering spirit that the cities involved emanated today and I am convinced: With the aid of a transparent application procedure and the early involvement of the municipalities the widespread acceptance of the citizens can be achieved. Holding the Olympic Games in the Rhine Ruhr District will provide the opportunity to stage an innovative and sustainable Games. It will create new dynamics for our state."

Marcel Philipp, Mayor of the City of Aachen:

"I see the alliance of the cities of the Rhine and Ruhr district for the Olympic Games as a huge opportunity! Not only because we would become even more closely networked on a supra-regional basis, but because Bonn as a city that is enthusiastic about sports would be delighted to be one of the hosts of the Rhein Ruhr City 2032.

Sören Link, Mayor of the City of Duisburg:

"We are supporting the initiative for sustainable Games in the region. Duisburg is a sporting city with outstanding sports facilities. We have proven that we can organise major sporting events among others through our participation in the Universiade in 1989 or the World Games in 2005. And the water world Wedau with its regatta course and the parallel channel definitely live up to Olympic standards. International major events at world-class level are held there regularly. The financing issue is of course a different matter, this is where the state and sponsors come into play."

Henriette Reker, Mayor of the City of Cologne:

"The Olympic Games have always been a festival of international understanding. And in times like these, we should take advantage of every opportunity to unite people beyond the borders. Olympic and Para-Olympic Games are always something very special and are associated with big hopes of all the parties involved. This also applies for the cities and regions that submit a bid to stage the event. I am supporting a bid because I am convinced: As a sporting city of international renown, Cologne would be a superb host for a sustainable, modern and impressive Olympic Games. The prerequisite is that the citizens of the city give this idea their positive vote. During the process of putting this project into practice, the focus has to be on sustainable developments for high-quality living conditions in the region."

Uwe Richrath, Mayor of the City of Leverkusen:

At the same time, there are so many sports facilities and hotels here that hardly any new infrastructure would have to be created for an Olympic Games. Christoph Tesche, Mayor of the City of Recklinghausen:
